Casa Italiana Zerilli-Marimò at New York University was founded in 1990 by Baroness Mariuccia Zerilli-Marimò with the goal of promoting Italian culture by offering a program of free events, open to everyone, on all topics related to Italian studies, including language, literature, cinema, music, theater, visual art, as well as politics, economics, and lifestyle. Casa's mission is to create a physical and virtual space for dialogue between Italy and the United States on all of these themes.

Owing to the generosity of its Founder, and its affiliation with a prominent institution of higher education, Casa Italiana has risen to prominence as a renowned Italian cultural center. It continues to foster scholarship and excellence in a wide range of fields and disciplines while simultaneously nurturing a vibrant community of scholars, students, and citizens.

Casa Italiana Zerilli-Marimò champions diversity and inclusion at all levels and promotes partnerships with public and private organizations that share its goals.

Building and public spaces

Casa Italiana, situated in a 19th-century brownstone, was built between 1851-1852 by Charles Partridge, displaying an Anglo-Italianate style with ornate cornices and decorative doors and windows in cherry wood. Some of Casa Italiana's furniture comes directly from the Zerilli-Marimò family, including the Baron's Italian Walnut monastery table from the XV Century that graces Casa's lobby.

Its public spaces include one art gallery with a floor in Italian marble for temporary exhibitions, an auditorium with over 100 seats for performances, talks and screenings, two large terraces and a backyard with a garden for receptions.
